

Declaration for a Soldier's Pension,

Who served Sixty days during the War of 1812

This Pension Declaration must be executed before a Judge or Clerk of a Court of Record, and if before the Judge, the Clerk thereof will certify said Judge's official capacity and signature, and attest the same under the seal of the Court.

A Justice of the Peace must not authenticate this paper. If he does, the work is utterly useless, and must be all done over again before a Judge or a Clerk of a Court of Record, as above stated

ON THIS the 23rd day of May A.D. one thousand eight hundred and seventy one, personally appeared before me (1) Clerk of the (2) County Court, a Court of Record within and for the County and State aforesaid, **Linchfield Wimberly** aged 73 years, a resident of (3) (blank) of the County of Sequatchie in the State of Tennessee, who being duly sworn according to law, declares that he was married, and that his wife's name was **Deidama Lasater**, to whom he was married at Bledsoe County, Tennessee on about 10th day of October A.D. 1819, and that he served the full period of sixty days in the (4) Military service of the United States; that he is the identical **Linchfield Wimberly** who was (5) enlisted in Captain Walker's company, in Colonel Beulins regiment, at Knoxville, State of Tennessee, on the (blank) day of November, 1813, and was honorably discharged at Fort Montgomery, State of Alabama, on the (blank) day of November 1814, and that he performed service as a (7) Private and was stationed at Fort Strodder, Fort Williams, Fort Jackson, Fort. Vernon, and Fort Montgomery in the State of Alabama.

(8) He further declares that he has received a **land warrant for 160 acres** which was issued on or about the (blank) day of (blank), 1853, by the Commissioner of Pensions, and he refers for additional evidence to the papers on which said warrant was issued; that he, at no time during the late rebellion against the authority of the United States, adhered to the cause of the enemies of the Government, giving them aid or comfort, or exercised the functions of any office whatever under any authority, or pretended authority, in hostility to the United States, and that he will support the Constitution of the United States; that he is not in receipt of a pension under any previous act; that he makes this declaration for the purpose of being placed on the pension roll of the United States, under the provision of the act approved February 14, 1871, and he hereby constitutes and appoints, with full power of substitution and revocation, **Thomas E. Lloyd**, of Washington, D.C., his true and lawful attorney, to prosecute his claim and obtain the Pension Certificate that may be issued. That his post office is at Dunlap, County of Sequatchie, State of Tennessee. that his domicile, or place of abode, is (same place.)
